

Matthew's Story. Ask your child to tell you the story of Yingtao's early days in his new school from the point of view of Matthew, Yingtao's new friend.


Reading Skills

Compare and Contrast

When authors write about two or more characters, places, events, or situations, they often want you to compare and contrast them.

- **Compare** means telling how two or more things are alike.
- **Contrast** means telling how they are different.

One way Yingtao and Matthew are alike is that they are both in the orchestra. This is a comparison. One way they are different is in the way they eat. Yingtao has been using chopsticks since he was two. Matthew had never used them. This is a contrast.

Side by Side. Cut out pictures of two landscapes, two cars, two people, two houses, and so on. Paste them next to each other on a sheet of paper. Tell how they are alike and how they are different.

Declarative and Interrogative Sentences

A sentence that tells something is a **statement.** Another name for it is a declarative sentence because it declares, or tells, something. It ends with a period.

Yingtao played the violin badly.

A sentence that asks something is a question. Another name for it is an interrogative sentence. It ends with a question mark.

Do you play the trombone?
